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Supplementary Results of the Economically Active Population Survey for the Young Population in May 2023

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Supplementary Results of the Economically Active Population Survey for the Young Population in May 2023

- ☐ In May 2023, the young population aged 15 to 29 totaled 8.416 million persons, which decreased by 179 thousand persons (-2.1%) compared to May 2022.
- O The labor force participation rate of the young population stood at 50.5%, down 1.0%p year-on-year.
- O The employed people aged 15 to 29 marked 4.005 million persons, falling by 99 thousand persons year-on-year. The employment-population ratio of the young population stood at 47.6%, down 0.2%p year-on-year.
- O The unemployed people aged 15 to 29 marked 247 thousand persons, falling by 73 thousand persons year-on-year. The unemployment rate of the young population stood at 5.8%, down 1.4%p year-on-year.



- ☐ It took 4 years and 3.3 months on average to graduate from a university (including a 2-year or 3-year college), which fell by 0.4 month year-on-year. 45.8% of college (or university) graduates had taken time off from college (or university), dropping by 0.8%p year-on-year.
 - O It took 5 years and 1.4 months on average to graduate from a university, which fell by 0.3 month year-on-year.


O Among people with the experience of taking time off from a college (or a university), their average period of taking time off was 1 year and 11.3 months, dropping by 0.6 month year-on-year.







- ☐ The young population with job experience at school or during time off from school stood at 43.1%, which fell by 1.2%p year-on-year. The share of the female young population with job experience (45.5%) was higher than that of the male young population with job experience (40.7%).
- O As for the main type of employment experience, 'Part-time employment' occupied the largest share at 74.4%, which was followed by 'Full-time employment' (10.7%) and 'On-the-spot internship' (9.1%).
- ☐ The young population with employment experience after graduation or dropout stood at 87.3%, which declined by 0.5%p year-on-year.
- O The graduates or dropouts with one-time employment experience stood at 39.2%, which fell by 2.1%p year-on-year.
- O 25.9% of the young population with employment experience thought that their recent job was highly relevant to their major. This share went up by 1.0%p year-on-year.
- O As for the main activity of the unemployed or economically inactive young population, 'Vocational training and preparation for employment exams' occupied 40.9%, falling by 0.3%p year-on-year. 'Just spending time doing nothing' occupied 25.4%, going down by 0.3%p year-on-year.
- ☐ It took 10.4 months on average to get the first job as a wage worker, which decreased by 0.4 month year-on-year.
- O The average service period of the first job was 1 year and 6.6 months, which fell by 0.2 month year-on-year.

- O As for the industry of the first job, 'Accommodation and food service activities' (15.5%) and 'Mining and manufacturing' (15.2%) marked the high shares. As for the occupation of the first job, 'Managers and professionals & related workers' (25.5%) and 'Service workers' (24.1%) marked the high shares.
- O As for the wages of the first job, the largest share (35.7%) of the young population earned '1.5 \sim less than 2 million won'. This share was followed by '2 \sim less than 3 million won' (31.3%) and '1 \sim less than 1.5 million won' (15.7%).
- O As for reasons for quitting the first job, 'Dissatisfaction with working conditions (including wages and hours worked)' occupied the largest share at 45.9%, up 0.8%p year-on-year.
- ☐ 15.2% of the economically inactive young population prepared for employment exams, dropping by 1.7%p year-on-year.
- O As for preparation for employment exams*, the largest share of the economically inactive young population prepared for exams for 'General government officials' (29.3%), which was followed by 'General enterprises' (27.3%).
 - * Preparation for employment exams covered the young population who prepared for exams for the past 1 week.
